11:30-13:00	<p>Maintaining the C20 momentum towards 2020: What has civil society learned from recent experiences in China, Germany and Argentina?</p> <p>This workshop will share good practices and identify approaches and challenges to strengthen the C20 during the coming years, with special emphasis on Japan and Saudi Arabia. Participate of the workshop.</p>	<p>Preventing debt crises and its negative social impacts</p> <p>Debt is rising in developing and developed countries, several countries are already in crises or had to request IMF loans with harsh austerity conditions attached. The new debt landscape makes crises more difficult to solve. Better institutions for prevention and resolution are needed to mitigate social impacts of debt crises.</p>	<p>Raising climate ambition and bringing new audiences to the G-20 process</p> <p>This workshop will develop a coordinated civil society strategy to ensure G20 outcomes demonstrate the strong commitment of G20 countries to act on climate change and, climate-resilient development. It will also bring faith leaders already active on climate discussions to engage on the G-20 process and provide an opportunity for cross-learning between the climate and faith communities.</p>

It will focus on two key aspects: discussing ways of not leaving anyone behind - the most vulnerable and marginalized groups - and discussing ways to effectively implement commitments around SDG16.</p>	<p>Future of Education and Jobs for the Digital Society in the framework of a rights-based economy</p> <p>This workshop promote a multistakeholder dialogue to tackle fair transitions, reduce social-economic impact of technological advances that are changing the nature of work and education, such as strengthening socio-emotional skills and access to educational practices to eliminate barriers. Understanding these shifts can help G20 to make informed decisions.</p>	<p>A discussion about how to make infrastructure work for sustainable development</p> <p>This workshop will discuss the challenges posed by the G20's work on infrastructure, particularly in terms of human rights, transparency, fiscal and environmental issues. It will look at recent proposals on infrastructure financing, for instance, the promotion of PPPs, and developing infrastructure as an asset class, and discuss different proposals, including on financial transparency, and on early and better planning, which will help us advance CSO work on reclaiming infrastructure as a 'public good.</p>

Also, it will analyse how the G20 ACWG can address the relationship between gender and corruption and do a commitment to introduce the topic in the next G20 working plans</p>	<p>Civic space restrictions and the protection of human rights defenders: Overview, new threats and civil society responses</p> <p>This workshop will provide an overview of civic space in G20 countries, identify novel threats to public participation through examples from the region, discuss the roles of governments and businesses in both restricting and fostering civic space, and present available monitoring, reporting and advocacy civil society tools.</p>
